Dear Friends,

Thanks to your dedication and support, we are making a difference in people's lives in the Asian American community.

In this time of acute need for accessible healthcare, amplified by the effects of a pandemic, racism, and social isolation, the mission of the Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation means more than ever.

The Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation provides funding and support for community-based healthcare services, primarily at the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center, which provides care to approximately 60,000 patients. This care is provided to anyone who needs it, regardless of their immigration status, their ability to pay, or the language they speak.

During the pandemic, the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center offered COVID-19 services that included over 66,000 vaccines in the community -- with particular focus on the elderly, non-English speaking, and medically vulnerable. With the backing and support of the Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation, the Health Center was able to respond quickly, far before federal funds were released. Along the way, the Health Center received recognition nationally for its work.

Your support is also helping pave the way for years to come. The Foundation made a significant contribution to fund the construction of a new state-of-the-art health center site in Flushing, Queens, operated by the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center. Once doors open this year, this location will expand access to affordable and high-quality care in one of the most diverse zip codes in the country.

Finally, your donations also support scholarships, learning, and career development opportunities for healthcare workers and Asian American youth in the community. These programs cultivate future generations of healthcare providers and leaders who share a passion for serving the community.

The mission of the Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation is to improve access to quality healthcare for underserved Asian Americans and other vulnerable populations.

Your support helps transform health in the community through:



High-Quality Healthcare

The Foundation provides financial support for community-based health services, primarily those provided by the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center. In 2021 more than 55,000 patients received care at the Health Center. Many patients have historically faced difficulty getting the care they need because of language, cultural barriers, income, or lack of health insurance.



Education & Career Development

Every year, the Foundation provides scholarship opportunities for Asian Americans to pursue careers in healthcare or career development opportunities. The Project AHEAD internship is another program that provides training and firsthand experience to undergraduate students interested in careers in this field.



Events and Fundraising

Every year, the Foundation organizes special events and giving initiatives in the community.

The Charles B. Wang Community Health Center's Healthview Project

Expanding access to high-quality health and dental care in Queens

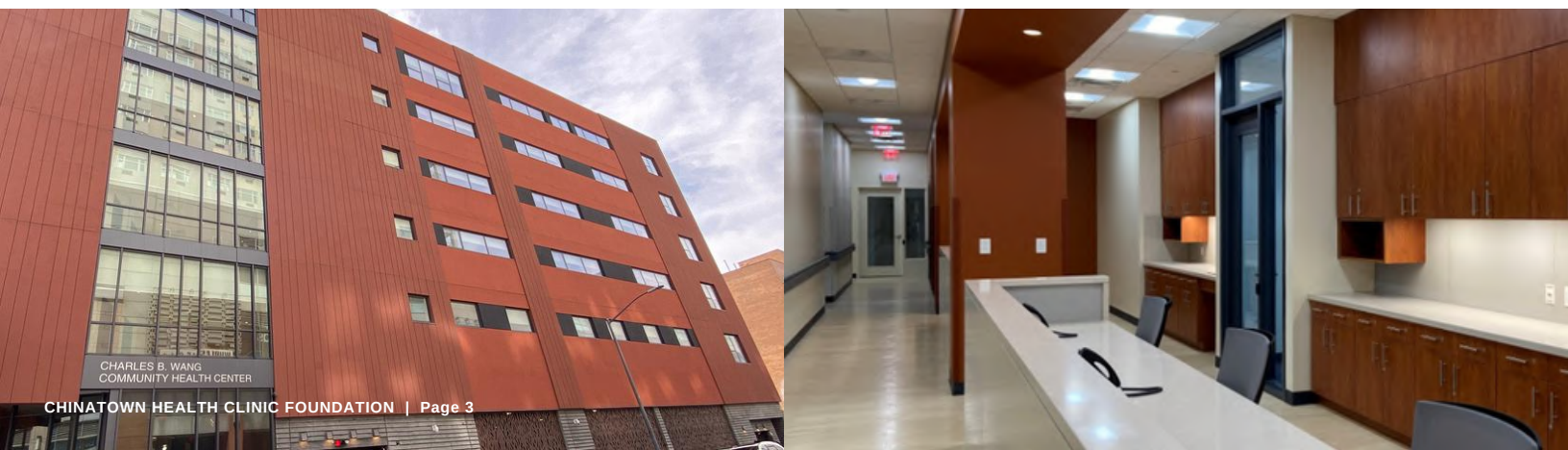
In 2019, the Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation (CHCF) made a substantial gift of \$10 million to the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center (CBWCHC) to support the land acquisition and construction of a new community health center. The CHCF also provided a \$7.1 million dollar loan which enabled Healthview CBWCHC Inc. to obtain a net benefit of \$2.7 million to the project through the New Markets Tax Credit program. At over 80,000 square feet, this state-of-the-art, environmentally friendly building will expand CBWCHC's award winning services. Aptly named the Healthview project, this new primary care access point will meet the vital health needs of the rapidly growing neighborhood by providing important medical, dental, mental health and enabling services for community residents. This site will serve as CBWCHC's third location in Queens. Constructed on a designated brownfield site, this will be situated amid a lively bustling retail, transportation, and residential hub in Flushing, Queens.

Community Impact

Set to open in 2022, Healthview will expand high quality primary health, mental health and dental care in Queens and will create a lasting positive impact for the community and its residents. Healthview will have 17 dental treatment rooms. As a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), all services including dental offer a sliding-fee scale which helps uninsured patients to receive affordable care. The site is projected to serve over 25,000 patients.

About the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center

CBWCHC has provided high quality, affordable and culturally appropriate healthcare services to medically underserved communities since 1971. As an FQHC and Patient-Centered Medical Home, CBWCHC ensures that all its patients, regardless of their ability to pay, are provided with comprehensive primary healthcare. The majority of its patients have lower income and frequently face cultural, linguistic and insurance barriers when it comes to accessing healthcare.



Each year, the Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation awards the Dickson Hee Scholarship and the Dr. Thomas Tam Scholarship to Charles B. Wang Community Health Center staff and local students. These scholarships were established in honor of Dr. Thomas Tam and Dickson Hee, prominent individuals who supported the vision of the Health Center. Through these scholarships, the Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation hopes to pave the way for young generations and front line staff of the Health Center to pursue academic opportunities and further their career in healthcare.

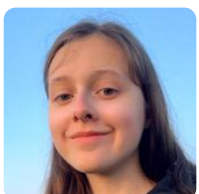

Project AHEAD Internship

Project AHEAD (Asian Health Education and Development) is a nine-week internship that provides firsthand training and experience to undergraduate students and recent graduates interested in pursuing a career in healthcare. The internship facilitates increased awareness and understanding of the historical and present issues shaping the health of Asian American populations. Each year, interns work on a Community Health Project (CHP) that addresses the community's most pressing health needs.

The 2021 Project AHEAD cohort continued this long-standing tradition with their CHP, a Health Needs Assessment study that focused on the populations who live and/or work in or near Flushing, Queens. This Health Needs Assessment will be used as a planning tool to help CBWCHC better address the needs of underserved communities and populations in Queens.

Elizabeth plans to attend medical school in the future.



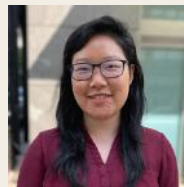

Kevin plans to apply for medical school with the ultimate goal to establish a private practice as a community pediatrician.



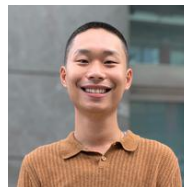
Crystal Huang

Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation 50th Anniversary Virtual Celebration

Honoring Our Past. Forging a Healthier Future.

The Chinatown Health Clinic Foundation traces its origins to 1971, when a group of highly motivated volunteers organized the first Chinatown Health Fair to provide health education and screenings to the medically underserved Chinese community in New York City. Operating under the belief that healthcare is a basic right, the ten-day event served more than 2,500 people who previously did not have access to health services in their own language. Over the next 50 years, the free clinic evolved into the Charles B. Wang Community Health Center, one of the leading community health centers in New York City, which the Foundation continues to support today.

In lieu of a typical in-person gala, the Foundation chose to use its 50th anniversary to virtually honor healthcare staff who have worked through the pandemic, and to host a scientific and community panel discussion on the COVID-19 pandemic. During this event which was held on May 5, 2021, more than \$570,000 was raised to help support community-based health services.
